95 bubble and boil for three and a half days. Stir it

105 with a wooden leg to get rid of any lumps.

117 3) Slop it into bowls and try your best not to be seasick.

33 women went against these rules and wanted to  
40 become pirates. Two famous female pirates were  
48 called Anne Bonny and Mary Read. These two  
57 women dressed up as men and fought as pirates  
64 fiercely and fearlessly. In November 1720, the  
73 ship that Anne and Mary were on was captured  
80 by a pirate hunter called Captain Jonathan  
88 Barnet. These two women were the only people  
96 onboard who were brave enough to fight against  
103 the enemy although, sadly, they were outnumbered  
109 and did not win the battle.



## Answers

**Captain Jonathan Barnet.**

**Accept any sensible answer linked to the text, e.g. Anne and Mary dressed as men so that they could become pirates as they knew that women were not allowed.**

**Accept any sensible inference linked to the text, e.g. Stefan would have been unhappy and cold because it says he was starting to shiver.**



3. What was in the crate that Stefan hid in?  
**potatoes and straw**



4. *'I was soaked to the skin...'*  
What does this phrase mean?  
**Accept any answer relating to the meaning of the sentence being that Stefan was wet through and his clothes were saturated.**
